### **What is e-waste?**

E-Waste includes all electronic and electrical products at or nearing the end of their useful life. Computers, televisions, VCRs, DVD players, digital cameras, mobile phones, stereos, photocopiers, printers and faxes are all common examples of electronic products that may end up as e-waste.

### **What is the problem?**

Planned obsolescence ensures that electronic equipment is only built to be functional or in-fashion for a short period of time. The volume of e-waste, therefore, continues to increase. Australians are some of the world's highest users of new technology, making e-waste the fastest growing segment of our waste stream and a growing challenge for business, residents and communities.

### **What impact does e-waste have on the environment?**

With good reason, used electronic products are defined as hazardous waste under the Hazardous Waste (regulation of exports and imports) Act 1989.

E-waste contains heavy metals such as lead, phosphorus, mercury, selenium and cadmium. If disposed of improperly, or into landfill, these toxic materials may be released into the environment, posing health and environmental problems. In addition to hazardous materials, e-waste also contains many non-renewable materials such as aluminium, copper, plastic and glass.

Every time e-waste is disposed of improperly and into landfill, valuable resources and materials that could be recovered and reused are lost forever, maintaining our need to mine for new minerals.

### **What should I do with my e-waste?**

We can all save precious resources and minimize waste by:

- Giving to someone who could use it
- Upgrading and repairing rather than replacing

- Recycling responsibly – by taking your items to an e-waste depot It is now illegal to put e-waste into landfill - DO NOT PLACE IN RECYCLING OR RUBBISH BINS, OR LEAVE ON THE STREET.

Some Councils collect e-waste in their hard rubbish collections. We encourage you to contact your Council to find out about their collections.
